Reclaiming the Care of Our Dying and Our Dead

Dying at home, after-death care, and home funerals are family- and community-centered responses to death. Through many millennia, this is how we cared for our dying and dead. The experience, while sad, is ultimately deeply gratifying. Grieving in the intimacy of our homes helps us comfort and support one another.

No law requires embalming. A family may prepare, file a death certificate.

A family may transport the deceased. Nothing in these processes is beyond our ability.

Facilitator Peg Lorenz will discuss all the legal facts and logistical details. She will talk about the enormous personal benefits that come with this profound moment in a family's life. We will follow four families who chose home funerals in an excerpt from the PBS documentary *A Family Undertaking*. There will be time for discussion, questions, and answers. In the final hour, for those who are interested, Peg will demonstrate bathing, dressing, cooling, and carrying the body.

A member of the Board of Directors of the National Home Funeral Alliance, Peg also chairs its Legislative Committee.
